


The Frick Collection Celebrates 150th Anniversary of Founder's Birth with Free Admission for Public on Sunday, December 19, 1999, Special Presentation of Drawings, and an Honorary Dinner

On the occasion of the 150th Anniversary of the birthday of founder **Henry** Clay Frick (1849 – 1919), The Frick Collection welcomes the public to join in a day of celebration by visiting the institution for no charge on Sunday, **December 19, 1999, from 1pm to 6pm**. In addition to the display of the remarkable permanent collection, which includes notable paintings, sculptures, and decorative artworks, a group of ten drawings purchased between 1913 and 1916 and rarely on public view will be shown. Represented in *Henry Clay Frick as a Collector of Drawings* are **Thomas** Gainsborough, Rembrandt Harmensz. van Rijn, James McNeill Whistler, and **Daniel Gardner**. On view from December 14, 1999 through January 30, 2000, this presentation offers the public an unusual opportunity to consider the eye of this great collector with respect to the drawings he studiously added to his magnificent holdings. Additionally, a dinner in appreciation of the institution's highest level of members, the Henry Clay Frick Fellows, will be held in the original elegant dining room, now one of the most popular galleries in the mansion, on Monday, January 17, 2000. The muchanticipated event, the third such annual celebration of the generous commitment made to the Collection by important supporters, also takes its theme from the 150th birthday anniversary of the founder.



Henry Clay Frick was born on December 19, 1849. The Pittsburgh steel magnate was renowned in life for his distinguished taste as a collector, and upon his death Frick bequeathed to the public 126 paintings by such masters as Bellini, Titian, Holbein, Rembrandt, Vermeer, Velázquez, and Whistler, as well as a fine collection of Renaissance bronze sculpture, major examples of Renaissance and eighteenth-century decorative art, Chinese porcelain, Limoges enamels, tapestries, and rugs. Also left to the public was the Fifth Avenue mansion in which these masterpieces are harmoniously installed, and The Frick Collection

opened to the public in 1935. Little is known about Henry Clay Frick as a collector of drawings, however this portion of his holdings reveals a refined eye at work. The presentation includes two chalk portrait studies and a

landscape in mixed media by Thomas Gainsborough, three drawings in ink and wash by Rembrandt, three pastels by Whistler, and a gouache and pastel portrait by Daniel Gardner. Frick purchased these drawings from a wide range of periods and schools with the same preference for serene landscapes and portraits as is also reflected in his selection of paintings.

The institution has recently introduced an Acoustiguide tour of the permanent collection and mansion, which will be offered at no charge, as always, to visitors on December 19, 1999. The Frick Collection is the only North American fine arts museum that offers a complimentary audio tour in tour in five languages: English, French, German, Japanese, and Spanish. A sixth, Italian, will be introduced this winter courtesy of Bulgari. The independently operated units allow visitors to create customized tours through the institution, selecting to hear narrations about the works and rooms in any order desired. This enormously popular development has allowed The Frick Collection to greatly enhance its informational offerings while maintaining the objective to provide the contemplative atmosphere of the private home a collector, an environment with a minimum of the traditional trappings of a formal museum.
